

Stansted Airport still in the frame

Those who oppose any further development at Stansted will never be able to relax. Although not in the prime spot for consideration, as both Heathrow and Gatwick will be considered first, Stansted still has a lot of spare capacity.

So why do airlines shy away from Stansted, preferring instead to use Heathrow and Gatwick? Long haul initiatives have all failed in the last twenty years and the smaller airlines all come and go in rapid succession, yet cargo operations still flourish.

Southend Airport is rapidly becoming a very serious contender for low cost airlines since its makeover has been very successful. Other problems for Stansted include the longer access time from central London which is also a turnoff it seems.

Improving the journey route will be very difficult. It is proposed two more lines from Liverpool Street to Broxbourne, but will this be enough? The same line also serves Cambridge and there are the commuters, who quite rightly consider themselves to be a forgotten breed in all this. They must be taken into account as well. Houses will need to be knocked down, bridges widened and this will be costly. The airport won't pay, but we will in our taxes. Despite all the Sunday closures the line is still very unreliable. The M11 will need widening, and something must be done to improve its road safety aspects. So many people are missing flights now, due to motorway incidents. This makes coach transport unreliable as well.

However, if the government has the will to develop Stansted, it will happen. The airport could grow well beyond the 35mppa it already has permission for. When it does reach around 28 mppa, then we can expect an application to increase passenger numbers. When it reaches 35mppa both the airport and the government will have their sights set on a second runway.

There is no indication of what type or where the runway would be sited, but the prospect is very much there. However there are developments happening all the time. There is work being done on "Boris Airport", which if this proves to be favourable will merit consideration of this site by the Airport Commission. It is also very surprising that neither Birmingham nor Manchester airports are being considered. Are they trying to add to road congestion and concentrate air travel in the south?

Nothing is certain, and a new government could change everything again. Enjoy Birchanger while you can, hopefully for a long time to come.

Not everyone in Birchanger is a friend in need.

Many of us like to think of Birchanger as a friendly place where people like to help each other out and make life easier for the community. Sadly it seems this is not always the case.

A Birchanger resident recently lost a large amount of cash while making their way home. The money was there at the start of the walk in the village, but not on arrival back at the house. Immediately the individual returned to the start point, but there was no sign of the cash, which had been in an envelope with the first name clearly marked. The money was simply nowhere in sight.

Someone must have picked up the envelope and seen the name on it, but to date has made no attempt to find the owner. They must have known that no way was that money legally theirs, until appropriate enquiries had been made. A family has had to find this money to make up the loss, whereas the finder enjoyed spending cash which they would have known belonged not to them, but to the name on the envelope.

Wonder how good that made them feel at the end of the day?

Over booking at Princess Alexandra Hospital.

Most of us who attend Princess Alexandra Hospital are used to having their appointments changed, sometimes at the last minute. We do our best to accommodate the new time, but occasionally this is just not possible.

This happened to me and the appointment was deemed to be needed quickly. When I telephoned, I was actually offered one on the day I had declined! Do they ever actually listen to the patient? I was even more dumbfounded when I was told that my time on the day had been over-booked four times. What has happened to their computer? How many booking lists are there? No wonder we spend so much time waiting to see the Doctor. Do people just fail to turn up? I thought if you did that without calling to explain you were out anyway. Is this the reason there is more than one patient for each slot? They must want us to stay at home or their schedule is impossible.

The next appointment on offer was some three months later. I am on a waiting list and I still have not heard. The date will be long beyond April 24th I fear now. Even if it was at 9am it could take the whole morning as the Doctors are almost inevitably late and as is very obvious, seriously overloaded with work and patients.

This is simply not good enough. No wonder people are visiting casualty more often as their conditions give cause for alarm. The stress is then on A and E, but often the knowledge there actually cannot properly advise the patient. The GP cannot cope when surgery is involved, that is if an appointment was available.

Surely it is not beyond the wit of the Governing Body at Harlow to provide a proper outpatient's service? In the long term it would save money, beds and of course, lives.

Time to sign up for your green bin

Many of us who have a green garden waste bin, or share one with a neighbour would not be without it now. Trips to the tip have been cut right down and the occasional free compost is both very good and very useful.

The collection resumes again in mid March and those who have a direct debit arrangement to pay the £40 per annum fee do not need to do anything. It will all be done for you automatically. For those who would like to have

However this year there is some really good news. The service will be extended to December 15th where there will be a short break over the Christmas period. It will resume in the week beginning January 19th. The cost will remain the same, for this year at least, at £40.

The charity's offices in Dunmow can be found opposite the Saracen's Head Pub on the road going out to Bishop Stortford: The Chestnuts • Suite 8 • 4 Stortford Road • CM6 1DA.

The Dunmow office was opened in 1994 in response to the rapid population growth in the area and the distance from Saffron Walden, a 30-minute drive away down narrow country roads with an infrequent bus service. As Pebble Padfield, our Great Dunmow supervisor, puts it, 'We are always fully booked on appointments – people who can't, or can't easily, make it to any of our other offices. Some urgent issues involving housing or court dates; some complex multiple issues. A lot of people who never thought they'd need to come to a Bureau, but one thing goes wrong and everything goes down like a string of dominoes ...'

School News

Teachers Feel the Strain.

The Winter months are the hardest for many people. Getting into work has been difficult, you are either drowned, blown away or propelled along roads which are more akin to skating rinks. Everyone around you has either got horrible flu like colds or diabolical stomachs and absenteeism can be so high that your own work load responds and reaches impossible amounts as you struggle to do the work of three people. Added to that you were attempting a dry January as well!
Jobs vary and some are more stressful than others. One of the worst professions is the teaching one. Everyone is after you, Mr Gove, Ofsted, the County council, colleagues and parents. Those who think teaching is an easy option need to take a closer look. Visit a teacher in August. They are not lounging around on a beach. They are writing lesson plans for the next year, marking and doing assessments. In between they try to get to know their families. Then the term starts again and it is back to an 8am start for breakfast club and a 6pm finish as the children from the after school clubs finally go home.

I can declare an interest with two daughters and a granddaughter who are teachers. One branched out as a psychologist, another has abandoned teaching in England to teach in China, while the third marks off the days to early retirement.

Perhaps it would be better if teachers were simply just allowed to teach and to be able to relax more in the classroom. Learning should be a happy experience but if a teacher is always having to watch their backs in order to tick the right box, please the parents, satisfy Ofsted, hit the targets, follow the plan, is that really helping the children to enjoy their learning?

Our schools are not doing as well as they should in the wider world. Is this because we keep changing things? As soon as the information on yet another new and definitely better strategy is sent down from on high and assimilated at grass roots levels, it is changed again. No wonder so many people do not bother to learn each "new fangled"

idea as it happens now. They know it will be "out" in a couple of years' time so why waste your time? Maybe we should simply let teachers alone to get on with the job of actually teaching. Chuck out the targets, the reams of regulations and simply just teach? Surely it cannot be worse than what is happening all over the country right now?

School Updates.

Search for a new Head teacher is underway. With the sad news at the start of the term that Headteacher, Mrs Warbrick would not be returning to the school, work immediately started on the process of finding a new Head teacher.

There is a set process for this which governors must go through, but it is hoped to involve as many people as possible in the search for the new head. At a Parent's Forum all parents present filled in post it notes listing the qualities they would most like to see in a head teacher, and the children have been asked the same question.

The staff will also have their say. All this will help to determine the wording of the initial advertisement as well as both job and person specification. The process will take some two months before the interviews can be held, but it is expected that as many people as possible will have a chance to meet the short listed candidates and tell the interviewing panel what they think.

If all goes well, the new head could be in place by September, the governors will not hesitate to go back and advertise again, if a suitable candidate is not found in the first round, which is what happened last time. Meanwhile Mr Slide will continue to fill the role of Head Teacher until the end of the summer term.
